Due to the major concern from members regarding the dead or brown patches on the fairways, I thought it was essential to explain precisely why this is happening and what steps Gavin will be taking to solve this issue.

Our fairways mainly consist of four different grass types. Kikuyu (warm season), Cynodon (warm season), Red Fescue/ Rye (cool season), and annual bluegrass or Poa (cool season). During this time of the year, the Kikuyu and Cynodon do exceptionally well. The red fescue or Rye is very heat tolerant but does not die out due to heat stress, but unfortunately, the native turf Poa (as we all know it) does not stand the heat. This turf then dies out, and as soon as the condition improves for the new spores to germinate, the brown or dead patches disappear along with the current conversation. Unfortunately, when the conditions for this Poa turf improve, the unfortunate event happens where the growth for the warm season grass slows down, and to grow the Kikuyu into these bare areas becomes limited.

For the golfers, this is a terrible time of the year visually. But for the greenkeeper, this is a small window period to determine where the remaining "problem" areas are. Then, with proper planning and patience, he can introduce more Kikuyu that will spread and cover these

Once Gavin has identified the problematic areas, he will propagate kikuyu in these areas. There are two ways to do this. The costly but immediate solution is to sod the areas with Kikuyu. The alternative is to make use of "sprigs." First, the affected areas are sodded out and replaced with growing medium and kikuyu sprigs. These sprigs are then covered with crop cover for about seven days, after which it is uncovered and allowed to grow. The last method is a slightly slower process but much cheaper.

Bunkers

The Bunkers is another issue often raised by golfers. As a result, the Golf Club has invested in a tiller/ rotavator to loosen some hard bunker surfaces. We tested the machine in the chipping bunker, and it worked very well. Rotovating all the bunkers will take a bit of time, but we will also identify which bunkers require new or more sand.

We look forward to the final result.
